37th Annual Edmonton Pride

On Thursday, June 8th, Edmonton kicked off their annual Pride Festival by raising a rainbow flag at City Hall. The festival includes a Pride Parade and their Pride in the Park event.

The festival aimed to celebrate the LGBT+ community, past steps made towards equality, and continued acceptance for the community.

The Parade Grand Marshal was the Edmonton Two-Spirit Community, and notable participants included: Rachel Notley and the NDP caucus;

the Liberal caucus; Alberta's MLgays; uniformed RCMP; Edmonton City Councilors; Edmonton Society of Atheists; University of Alberta Ambassadors; Unitarian Church of Edmonton; and the Edmonton Catholic School Teachers. Major business included: Telus; Shaw: Kiss 91.7; Radisson; and David's Tea.

Protesters did little to dampen the mood of the festival and wet drowned out by music well before the parade started. Observers of the parade gathered around protesters at times to form their own counter-protest to the protesters.

The Pride in the Park Festival was also held on Saturday, from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. and included food trucks, live music, and vendors of clothing, jewelry, Pride flags, and other merchandise. The Liberals and NDP were both present; the Liberals collecting signatures for a petition on their Bill C-16 and the New Democrats holding a draw for a Pride flag signed by Rachel Notley and the MLgays (Alberta's first openly gay members of the Legislative Assembly).

Sunday, June 18th marks the end of the festival with, among other events, the Mayor's Pride Brunch in Support of Camp fYrefly.

Penguins go Back to Back After Defeating the Predators

Led by captain Sidney Crosby, the Pittsburgh Penguins won their second straight Stanley Cup, defeating the Preds in Nashville by a final tally of 2-0. Pittsburgh became the first team in this century to win consecutive titles, as Crosby captured his second Conn Smythe. The game wasn't without controversy, as a quick whistle by the referee prevented a goal by Nashville forward Colton Sissons, who has been a dynamic force throughout these playoffs. The game was a back and forth affair, but incredible by performances by goalies Pekka Rinne and Matt Murray kept the game scoreless for the first 58 minutes, but a goal by former Preds forward Patric Hornqvist gave the Pens a 1-0 advantage. This was followed by an empty netter from Carl Hagelin gave them a lead they would not relinquish, as that was the final score in the final game of the NHL season.

<u>Lebron James; Greatest Basketball Player of All Time? It's not as Unfathomable as many Would Lead you to Believe</u>

Regardless of what happened this series, Lebron James has closed the gap on Michael Jordan. The media continues to use Lebron's finals record against him in the discussion of who the greatest of all time is. They state that since Lebron currently is 3-5 in the finals, and Michael is 6-0, that this means Jordan is leaps and bounds better in comparison. Another reason against Lebron being involved in the conversation is that he had to leave Cleveland in order to win a championship, while Jordan won all 6 with the team that drafted him, the Chicago Bulls. These statements may lead individuals to believe that Lebron is nowhere near Michael, but he is in fact on the cusp of being recognized as the greatest player of all time.

King James' statistical accomplishments are out of this world. He is currently 9th in career scoring and is on pace to pass Kareem Abdul Jabbar as leading scorer, is already the all time leading point getter in the playoffs, and is 12th in assists and the only non point guard in the top 25. An argument against this success is that he played in a watered down league where only 5-6 teams were strong. However, this is actually a strength in his case, as in the 1990s very few teams had more than one superstar, as the Jazz had Malone and Stockton, the Bulls had Jordan, Pippen, and Rodman, and the SuperSonics had Payton and Kemp. This allowed Michael to dominate, as he routinely had 3 of the 4 best players on the court on his side. Meanwhile Lebron has battled with several super teams over the years, like the Garnett, Pierce, and Allen lead Celtics of the late 2000s or the Spurs throughout the past 15 years as Duncan, Parker, Ginobili, Leonard and Aldridge have all starred. There's also the Durant, Westbrook, and Harden Thunder, and the most talented of all, the current Warriors lead by a pair of MVPs in Durant and Curry, a pair of elite defensive players with Green and Iguodala, and one of the league's best scorers in Thompson. Simply put, Lebron has had to deal with much stronger competition and has put up better production over the course of his career than Jordan.

While Jordan has been at the forefront of the discussion revolving around who is the greatest player of all time, I believe he now has a challenger. The critics that claim that Lebron's statistical achievements do not surpass Jordan's despite being better because of the quality of the league need to take reconsider their opinion, as the league is much stronger now than it was in the 90s. While Michael may be on top for now, he must not get too comfortable as the King is coming for his throne.



How To Use a Fire Extinguisher

Firess are a common emergency, especially in the workplace. They can be extremely dangerous if they are not handled properly. In order to act quickly and efficiently in an emergency fire, one must understand how to use a fire extinguisher. One simple fire extinguisher training technique is to remember the "PASS" method:

- 1. **P**ull the pin on the extinguisher.
- 2. Aim the hose nozzle low toward the base of the fire.
- 3. Squeeze the handle to release the extinguishing agent.
- 4. Sweep the nozzle from side to side at the base of the flames until extinguished.

Please remember that fire extinguishers are only to be used for small fires. If a fire becomes too large or the environment is too dangerous, one must evacuate the area.

The following are more steps to follow in response to a fire:

- If appropriate, sound the fire alarm or call the fire department immediately.
- Determine an evacuation route safe of flames, excessive heat and smoke BEFORE approaching the fire. Do not allow this evacuation route to become blocked.
- Use the PASS technique for discharging an extinguisher and back away from the area if the fire flares up again.
- If the extinguisher is empty and the fire is not out, or if the fire grows beyond what can be handled safely, evacuate immediately.

The following are indications that one must not attempt to use a fire extinguisher and instead, must evacuate the area immediately.

- The fire is too large. The fire involves flammable solvents, is partially hidden behind a wall or ceiling, cannot be reached from a standing position, or covers more than 60 square feet in area.
- The air is unsafe to breathe. Levels of smoke make the fire impossible to fight without some form of respiratory protection.
- The environment is too hot or smoky. Radiated heat is easily felt, making it hard to approach a fire within adequate range of using the extinguisher (about 10-15 feet). If it is necessary to crawl on the floor to avoid heat or smoke and/or visibility is poor.
- Evacuation paths are impaired. The fire is not contained and heat, smoke or flames block potential evacuation routes.

It is important to be prepared for any emergency especially small, workplace fires. In order to ensure the safety of oneself and others, one must know how to assess a situation and determine the best course of action. As an extra precaution, be sure to be trained in fire extinguisher use on an annual basis.


No Churn Oreo Ice Cream

- Spread this mixture into a loaf pan.
- Cover with foil and freeze for 6 hours or until firm.




